

- Improved extra-curricular participation following their re-establishment after COVID 19.
- Increased opportunities for sport experiences days in order to widen our children's knowledge and experiences within sport.
- CPD for staff particularly ECT's in regards to team-teaching and subject specific CPD linked to cricket.
- More than doubled our School Games Participation (5 events attended)
- 8 children in year 5 trained as 'Sports Leaders' in order to increase opportunities for active lunchtimes.
- Intervention sessions for least active children not getting 30 minutes of physical activity each day and those with SEN.
- A range of sporting clubs offered across the school (football, tennis, dodgeball, cricket, gymnastics)
- Girls football club running for the first time and having 25 girls sign up throughout the year.

- To continue to increase the confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and Sport (targeted CPD – gymnastics, dance & rugby) (Key Indicator 3)
- To raise the % of 25m swimmer by 2024/25 (Key Indicator 4)
- To continue to give our pupils a broad experience of a range of sports and activities by liaising with local companies to provide workshops for non-curricular/common sports. (Key Indicator 4)
- To increase competitive sporting opportunities for all pupils by hosting 5 Inter-House competitions throughout the year. (Key Indicator 5)
- To increase competitive sporting opportunities for all pupils by taking part in 10 School Games Competitions throughout the year. (Key Indicator 5)
